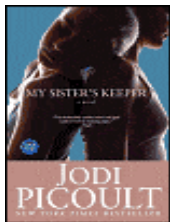
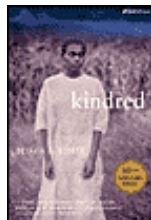

 Riveting read, couldn't put it down. A bit of time travel involved, but fascinating premise.



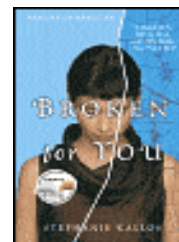
May 16

 A memoir or sorts, about Shanghai in the 1930s, from a young American girl's perspective. Liked it a lot.



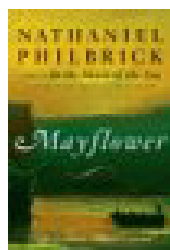
October 18

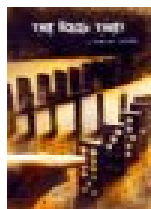
**"Little Women"**
